### 12 Herds in County Pass 30 Pound Mark

Belmont.—The four supervisor-testers at work for the Allegany County Dairy Herd Improvement Association have reported 75 herds on test during February. Six new members enrolled during the month and one discontinued.

Of the 12 herds averaging over 30 pounds of butterfat per cow last month, the registered Jersey four-cow herd of H. B. Covell & Son, Wellsville, made 37.2 pounds per cow, the 20-cow herd of registered Holsteins owned by James A. Young & Son, Angelica, milked three times daily, averaged 50.8 pounds, and the 10-cow registered Holstein herd of Carl Clarke, Andover, 48.4 pounds. The Covell herd cows averaged 177 days fresh, the Young herd, 131, and the Clark herd, 96.

A study of the figures furnished to the Farm Bureau by the supervisors shows that in three herds the average per cow production last month was under 10 pounds; in eight herds, between 10 and 15 pounds; 28 herds between 10 and 20; 31 herds between 20 and 30, and nine between 30 and 37.2 pounds.

Other cows averaging over 30 pounds of butterfat each and their production were in these herds: Lawrence Perkins, Andover, 33.9; R. E. Spicer, Independence, 30.2; Robert McNinch, Belmont, 34.2; George Sheffield, Angelica, 32.1; John Sullivan, Angelica, 30.8; Mark Sanford, Little Genesee, 33; Glenn Wightman, Bolivar, 34; Charles Burr & Sons, Houghton, 33.4, and Ceylon Snider, Fillmore, 34.
