#### , Ancient Metal

Tin was one of the earliest metals discovered. It is mentioned in several books of the Bible, and was known to the Phoenicians and the Romans. It is usually found in complex ores associated with other metals. More than half of the world's annual peacetime ore yield came from British Malaya and the Netherlands Indies, Bolivia rated high with about a fifth. Other normal sources are Thailand, China, Nigeria, Australia, Great Britain, (Cornwall), Burma, and the Belgian Congo. None of the latter countries produced a tenth of the world's France and Belgium for use in liberated Europe.

#### Selecting Cantaloupe

the melon must have been picked just at the right time. Look at the picked just ripe enough, the melon will have a clean scar where the stem used to be. If picked too green, it will have part of the stem still attached or a rough deep scar where it was pulled out. A cantaloupe should be firm and well netted. The blossom end opposite the stem end Carl Shutt was home from will be firm, and a slight golden color will be seen through the netting which covers the melon. When the fragrance from a melon is pleasant that is a good indication that it is ripe.

### Mud Minnow

The mud minnow is another common fish which is often confused with the true minnows. Mud minnows belong to a small family which is distantly related to the pike family. This family contains several species, one of which is found in the upper Mississippi drainage and in southern Canada. The heavy cylindrical body and rounded tail of the mud minnow cause many people to mistake it for a young dogfish. Its body is usually a rich mottled or the base of the tail. It seldom reaches a length of over four inches and as the name implies is partial to muddy bottoms of bogs and swampy lakes.

Poison Ivy Treatment Medical science has not yet developed a sure cure for a bad case of poison ivy. Some inoculations have been successful but they must be taken before the season. The best you can do is to keep it from spreading, soothe the itching — and hope tt-will clear up soon. Wash with soap, water and rubbing alcohol. Cover the infected skin with calomine lotion to which enough carbolic acid has been added to make a 2 per cent solution. This will help ease the itching, You can also secure relief by applying dressings soaked in a solution of epsom salts. Above all things DON'T SCRATCH. This spreads the poison and can cause additional infections.


