There have been many questions about the refrom May 12th thru May 31st, according to Carl M. Metzger, strictions on gas heating. Here are the ones asked

What use of gas do the restrictions cover?

The restrictions prohibit the use of gas for new space heating, whether it be in places formerly heat. or ed by other fuels, or for additional gas-fired equip. ment in places already heated partly by gas.

Do the restrictions in any way effect the use of gas for cooking, refrigeration, heating of hot water. or other uses except space heating?

Do the restrictions prohibit the installation of new services for gas use?

No, but space heating is not allowed with gas supplied through these new services during the perand physicians in Western New loud covered by the restriction order.

> How long will these restrictions exist? Don't plan on any change before May 1, 1948.

Do the restrictions prevent me from replacing present gas heating equipment with new gas heating equipment?

No, provided no additional space is heated by the new equipment.

I heat my home entirely by small gas stoves. May I replace these with a central unit such as a floor

Yes, such a replacement may be made within the terms of the restrictions, provided no additional

If I move from my present residence to another e, may I use my own gas-fired heating equipment

If it has been heated with gas by the previous resident, this is permissible.

Do these restrictions apply throughout the territory supplied by Empire Gas & Fuel Co., Ltd.?

Yes, they apply to our entire territory. Similar strictions apply to practically all areas served by Inatural gas in New York State.

Are there any exceptions provided for in the all restriction order?

Yes. If you believe that you are entitled to an exception under the terms of the order, you should make application at the nearest office of the gas company and secure written approval.

What about violations of this restrictive order? Under the terms of the restrictive order, where violations occur, the Company must discontinue all gas service until any equipment installed in violation of the order has been disconnected. Only then can the normal allowable gas service be restored.

Why are these restrictions necessary now?

New heating customers require new supplies of gas to take care of their use, and these new supplies of gas cannot be made available to us until additional pipe line facilities are built from the vast natural gas reserves of the southwest part of the country to the Appalachian region. There seems to be little hope of having these facilities completed sooner than the spring of next year, 1948. When these facustomers to our lines once more. time, the restrictions are necessary to protect and all safeguard service to our present customers.
