FIRE WASTE HIGHEST IN 20 YEARS

THE NATION'S fire waste in 1946, an estimated total of \$561,487,000, was the highest in U. S. history. This huge loss nearly exceeded the record loss of \$561,980,000 in 1926.

The 1946 loss represents an increase of 23 per cent over estimated losses of \$455,329,000, recorded in 1945, and 83 per cent higher than losses of \$306,-|| 469,520 in the last pre-war year, 1940.






