#### Front Plate Illegal During 1953

The 1952 plates expire at midnight, Monday, February 2. The opinion on use of the old plate, prepared by Mortimer

Kassell, counsel to the motor Vehthat a 1951 amendment to the Vehicle and Traffic Law provided that one number plate would issued for 1953 "which shall be displayed on the rear of the Vehicle and none shall be displayed on the front."

"It is entirely clear from the foregoing," said Mr. Kassell in his ruling, "that the use of a number plate for a previous year, when the 1953 plate is displayed on the rear is illegal."

Prior to the 1951 amendment. the law said that when only one plate was issued "none need be displayed on the front."

Every must wear a tag of the carrent single dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not protected by law and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog may be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumptive evidence that the dog is un-

Dog licenses must be obtained from the clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or

License fees: Male dog, \$2.25: emale dog, \$5.25; spayed female No license can be issued for

less than the full license year. The owner of a dog who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs penalty of \$10.00 and costs. The enumerators of towns and the police department of cities are required to prepare in January of each year a list of dog The omission of the owners. name of an owner from such lists will not excuse the owner from obtaining a license.
