A larger tonage of hay will be harvested than a year previous July rainfall was light in the southeastern and south central counties and below normal in the counties along the shore of Lake Ontario. Precipitation was near normal or above in most other New York counties. Temperatures averaged a little below normal except for the southeastern portion of the State.

Patures on August 1 were in good to excellent condition for that date in many areas, but were furnishing little feed on many Hudson Valley farms and were only poor to fair in the counties bordering on the southern edge of Lake Ontario. The harvesting of a good crop of 2nd cutting hay was underway in many counties as of August 1, but yields were light in the Hudson Valley. The harvest of a high yielding oat crop has started in the central, western and northeastern counties. Yields were lighter in the southeastern

Apple prospects in the Hudson Valley and Champlain areas are better than last year while the prospective crop in the Lake Ontario area is less than last year. In the Ontario area lighter crops of Baldwin, Northern Spy, Romes, and McIntosh are in prospect, while D. I. Greenings are much heavier than last year. In the Hudson Valley large crops of Cortland, McIntosh and Delicious are in prospect. A severe hail storm struck portions of Ulster, Dutchess and Columbia Counties on July 29, reducing quality of fruit heavily in some orchards. Grape prospects are below last year especially in the Finger Lakes area. The peach crop is a\_ near failure in most New York orchards this year.
