



If you hav e small children at least as often as the rest of us. Besides being subject to the common causes of headaches this time of year, young parents suffer the additional hazards of noise and loss of sleep.

You may not think of aspinin as pleasant to chew, but many children like the taste and eat it like candy if they can get to it. Candy-coated aspirin appeals to some children who wouldn't touch the ordinary variety.

Aspirin isn't dangerous to the grown-ups but it can be a very when taken in large doses. / month rarely passes without some child being admitted to Children's Hospital in serious condition after er the child, the more readily he is affected.

Aspirin poisoning has certain definite symptoms which every parent can recognize. The child becomes drowsy, vomits, refuses to eat and has deep, rapid breathing. If he doesn't get medical attention promptly, he will lose consciousness. His breath may have a peculiar sweetish odor and he may suffer from convul-

If your child shows any of these symptoms or if you know your child has raided the aspirin bottle—call "our doctor immediately. Better still, prevent aspirin pois oning by keeping aspirin tablets and any drug containing aspirin where children cannot see it or reach it. A locked medical cabinet is the best place.




