

Notice To Owners And Harborers of Dogs

Dog licenses for 1957 expired on December 31st, 1957. The in the 1958 Agricultural Conser- 1958 license fee was due January 1st. Licenses so issued will cover the period from January to December 31, 1958. Every dog must wear a tag of the current

> and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction. An unlicensed dog must be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presumption evidence that the dog is un-

> Dog licenses must be obtained from the cierk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or

License fees: Male dog, \$2.25; Female Dog, \$5.25; spayed Female dog, \$2.25. No license can be issued for

less than the full license year. The owner of a dog, who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a pentalty of \$10.00 and costs. The enumerators of towns and the police department of cities are required to prepare in January of each year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from such lists will not excuse the owner from

obtaining a license. If you owned a dog last year and do not own one now, so advise the clerk of your town or
