



Local Business Seminar Held

Results of the survey on "How's business in the Alfred area?" taken by members of the Department of Economics and Business at Alfred University were released at the Seventh Annual Invitational Seminar for local businessmen

Moderated by Professor Henry langer, the panel consisted of George Frank of Cleveland, Assistant to the President and Director of Public Relations for the Erie Railroad, B. W. Sauter, general manager of the Westingthouse Electronics Division in Bath, Joseph Waitkus, assistant technical manager of Air Preheater Corporation in Wellsville, and Harry R. Fillmore, plant manager of SKF Industries in Hornell.

All four men failed to predict any serious recession for local business. They were asked to comment on their respective company's plans for 1958 in regard to the general economic forecast of a decline in business activity on a

Their opinions were confined to conditions only in the Alfred University Study Area, a geographic region which includes parts of three counties, Allegany, Steuben and Livingston, with Hornell as the approximate center. The area includes 33 cities and towns and has a total population of near-

\$ 80.000 people. The report indicated that 1957 was not as good a year as 1956 and that individual expectations indicate a squeeze on profits in 1958. The attitude of area business leaders is definitely one of "caution" according to the per-

Tight money does not seen to be a factor in the local area. A further investigation of this phase indicated that commercial banks will continue their policy of taking care of the "legitimate requirements of business and indi-

In regard to agriculture, the survey showed that the forecast in general business on a national scale should not influence local

Area residents continued to increase their debt obligations in 1957 and collectors are reporting somewhat more difficulty than

Present employment figures are at a record high and unemmonths forecast by area employers calls for stability. A mere four-tenths percent decline is an-
