

Asking Help For Disaster Fund

John Church, Allegany County Chairman reports that the Na-Tional Red Cross is seeking con tributions of \$5,000,000 for the flood areas of Eastern Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia.

Red Cross workers revised earlier estimates and announced that in the affected tri-state area 15,-696 families had been affected, 196 homes were destroyed, 2,103 dwellings were seriously damaged and 10,854 homes suffered less extensive damage. A total of 350 trained distaster workers are on the job to help volunteers in 35 counties provide Red Cross assistance for flood sufferers who will need help for recovery.

The Allegany County Chapter has been given a quota of \$838 for this relief operation. In most of the chapter the fund campaign for 1957 was held last fall instead of in March 1957. However, the fund campaign failed to reach the needed quota by \$2,000 and there are no reserves to meet this emergency need.
