Why You Should Vote YES On School Addition

Can We Lose Our High School?

YES! If Andover Does Not Meet The Full Requirements of the State Dept., it is entirely possible that the state might revaluate the Master Plan and combine us with Wellsville.

Would the elimination of the swimming pool cut the overall costs much?

Answer: NO! The State would require a gymnasium or other simliar physical education station to take the place of the swimming pool.

Question: What will the addition to the school cost the individual taxpayer?

Answer: An increase of $4\frac{1}{2}$ mills (or \$4.50) per each one thousand dollars of assessed valuation. Example: An assessed valuation of \$2,000 would be figured as \$2,000 x 4.50 equal \$9.00 increased tax.

Question: How will the new tax rate compare with the tax rate of other Centralized School Districts in New York State?

Answer: We will still be below the average tax rate paid by the 440 School Districts in New York State. We would still have one of the lowest tax rates in Allegany County.

Question: Is every child entitled to a full time teacher?

Answer: YES! At present we have two combination grades, the 3rd and 4th and 5th and 6th, where the children receive only half of the teacher's

■ Question: Are We Overcrowded at this Time?

Answer: YES! (A) The present cafeteria was built to accomodate 100 students. Today 300 students have to eat in shifts from 11 A. M. to 1 P. M. with three other grades eating in their class

(B) The Music Dept., has no place which it

can call its own. They are using the stage and boiler room and the downstairs kindergarten room after school. We have no place for storage of instruments, robes and band uniforms (C) The entire Junior High School will be crowded beginning next year due to the size of classes that are presently-enrolled in grades, kindergarten thru sixth.

These are only three of the major congested area; — there are many additional ones.

Question: Will the school population grow?

Answer: YES! The present school was built to handle 500 students. With present normal increase, the enrollment will be approximately 700 students in 6 years LET'S NOT EVADE THIS ISSUE!

Question: What is the total cost of the proposed addition?

> Total estimated cost \$480,000 Amount of State Aid at 60.35% 289,680

Cost to local School District \$190,320 The State will also pay 60% of the interest. As of January 1, 1959 the State will only pay 50% of the cost and interest. We would lose \$49,680 plus 10% more in interest.

Question: Is this a favorable time to build?

Construction costs are at their lowest level in five years and interest rates are at the lowest point in 2 years. These figures are furnished by the State Education Dept.

Question: What is the value of a swimming pool to our educational system and to the Community?

Answer: Every child and adult should have the opportunity to learn to swim. With a supervised program of instruction this will become possible. We feel that one life saved thru this program is well worth the cost of the pool.
