They report the cultural college, will speak on food picture shapes up like this: More pork than in 1957 will offset reductions in beef and yeal, and a larger share of the total beef supply will be of the better grades. About the same amount of lamb can be expected. Signs point to one pound less of red meat per person than in 1957

when the average consumption was 159 pounds per person. There'll be more chicken meat but less turkey meat in 1958. Last year we averaged 11.1 pounds of poultry meat per person. Fewer eggs are in prospect the first half of this year compared with a year ago which means that egg prices

may be higher. Supplies of milk and dairy products will be abundant, and nutritionists urge a generous use of them. Canned vegetables aren't as plentiful as a year ago but supplies will be ample until the new packing season. There are plenty of frozen vegetables. Fresh vegetable prospects for winter meals were dimmed by freezes in Florida and Texas.

About the same amount of canned fruit is on hand as a year ago, plus more frozen fruit, and more fresh apples.




