Selective Service College Qualification Test

The Selective Service College Qualification Test will be offered offered for the 1957-58 school year, the național director emphasized.

Scores made on the test are urged by local boards as one guide in considering requests for deferment from military service to continue studies.

Application cards and instructional materials may be obtained Selective Service local boards in the near future. Men planning to take the test were urged by General Hershey to make early application at the nearest local board office for fuller information and necessary forms and materials.

Either the score made on the test or class standing may be used by local boards as guides in considering applications for student deferments. Thousands of students have been deferred since the testing program was begun in

General Hershey urged every student to take the test if he believes the test score will aid the local board in determining his status. He pointed out that such information, like other informasupply to local boards, is important to both the individual and the Nation. The Selective Service System long has been aware of the need to add to our trained manpower in all fields, and has done-something-about it, the-Gengrams as that for student deferments in which the test score plays



never will. Little enough is known about the reasons why children stutter. And there's no single method of treatment that can be prescribed in all cases. A speech pathologist should prescribe for the child Sometimes speech therapy alone is sufficient; sometimes psychotherapy is also needed.

Man" small children will stutter a little during the "learning to talk" period, when their speech apparatus just can't keep up with the ideas they want to express.
