Farmers who are eligible to vote in the wheat quota referendum are all those who in 1959 will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain on a farm, except those who are participating in the 1958 feed wheat program. Feed wheat participants are permitted to grow up to 30 acres of wheat for use only on being subject to maketing quota

If the quotas are not approved by at least two-thirds of the growers voting, they will not be in effect, and price support will be available to farmers who comply with their farm wheat allotments at about \$1.20 per bushel, or 50" of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Miles.
