Outdoor Meals

Outdoor meals need not complicated or expensive. Almost anything you serve indoors can be fun served outside in good weather. And although steak is the widely known favorite for outdoor cooking, there are other cuts far more economical and tasty as

Everyone knows that hamburgers and hot dogs are low in price. But stew meat and pot roast types ---of-meat are economical, too, and make delicious outdoor fare. moist heat in a cast-iron Dutch oven—cowboy style. Boiled beef or chicken may be served with

Cold cuts make good sandwichsandwich fillings, as do low cost

Fresh and frozen fish are abundant this summer—just made to order for a fish fry in the open. For example, ocean perch, that is generally sold as filets can cost as little as 13 cents a serving. These are easiest to handle if partially thawed, then cooked in a heavy frying pan over medium

Kobobs are fun to serve at outdoor meals and can be either a bargain or a special extravagance, depending upon the choice of meat. Ring bologna chunks, weiners, ready-to-eat ham come to less than 20 cents a serving. Chunks of canned ham, shoulder and leg of lamb or yeal, boneless beef rump, sirloin tip-all cost from 20 to 30 cents a serving. Chunks of sirloin steak, on the other hand, represent a real splurge a over 30 cents a serving. Of course, the fun of kobobs lies in loading the Stewers with meat and endless combinations of vegetables and fruit; canned pineapple chunks, cucumber slices, pieces of dill pickles, canned sweet potatoes, half-inch zucchni slices, tomato wedges, green peppers, small cooked onions, potatoes or

Kobobs can be soaked in or brushed with a barbecue sauce. Less tender chunks of meat can be treated with a meat tenderiz-

Look for preparations containing zirconium which neutralizes urushiol, the toxic principle of poison ivy. To be effective, treatment must begin as soon as possible after exposure. If you expect to be in contact with poison ivy, use the preparation in advance on

exposed areas of the skin. People vary considerably in the -strength-of their reaction to ivy poisoning, and no preparation is fool-proof. So don't rush in where angels fear to tread. Learn to identify the noxious plant by its shiny dark green leaf divided into three leaflets. Avoid poison ivy areas even when the leaves are cone. The whole plant, stem and roots as well as leaves, can poison
