## Better Health For Children

Community Service Issued by Children's Mospital of Buffale, N. Y.

Doctors at Children's Hospital advise area parents that should Asiatic flu reach Western New York and even affect as many as per cent of our people, parents can protect themselves and their children by learning the essential facts about influenza and cooperating calmly with public health officials and private physicians. Here are the simple facts on

Asiatic fl<del>u. —</del> . Influenza is a disease of the respiratory tract, spread from perto person by direct contact speaking and sneezing. ifectious, it spreads\_rapidly. The disease varies in severity but a large majority\_of cases in most epidemics are of the milder sort. Disease Not Serious

Physicians at Children's Hospital point out that although Asiatic flu has spread rapidly in the Far East, where it first appeared, is not serious. Most patients are ill for only three to five days. The flu comes on suddenly and symptoms are much the same as those of other types of flu—fever, weakness, muscle aches and run-

Influenza is caused by viruses, very tiny protein molecules which infect the insides of cells. Too small to be seen by the ordinary microscope, viruses can be photographed by the electron nucro-

The virus causing Asiatic' flu has been isolated. It is a variant of group A influenza virus, a virus which has already demonstrated a capacity to change. Because Asitic flu virus is a new form, no one had been exposed to it previously. so that 1:0 one had had the opportunity to build up antibodies to fight off infection. Without such antibodies, persons who are exposed to the disease contract it

Now Is Time To Make Plans For Pasture Seeding

Plans for new pasture seedings should be made now, not next

Prof. W. K. Kennedy, agronomst with the State College of Agriculture, reminds farmers that there's not much point in spending money for good seed unless the soil has the right amount of lime and fertilizer. His advice is "get curity records. soil samples now." Lime can be spread this fall.

For well-drained soils, Kennedy recommends a mixture of Narragansett alfalfa, ladino clover. and smooth brome grass, This mixture will give good production nell, only two-thirds acre was used for each cow this summer. The mixture may be seeded in oats which are later grazed or cut for

On land too wet for alfalfa, the specialist suggests using European birdsfoot trefoil with timothy or smooth brome. Best way to manage this pasture is through rotational grazing, giving each plot a 3 - to - 4 week rest.

Land not suited to mowing or frequent reseeding should be put
