





Duck hunters, particularly from the Finger Lakes region, central and western New York counties have contended for a long time that the duck hunting seasons established in the past have discriminated against the diving duck hunters in that those seasons closed too early to allow any reasonable hunting for diving ducks which normally arrive in New York-State late in the year.

The Federal Government has reduced the duck hunting season from 70 days in 1957, to 60 days 1958. A "straight" season of 60 days, in the pattern of recent years, would, with an Occember 14th. This closing date would in the opinion of the central and western New York diving duck hunters, deprive them of most of their hunting oppor-
