The first American Thanksgiv----ing Day was celebrated during the second winter the Pilgrims spent in the New World. The first winter in Massachusetts had killed nearly half the colonists, but new hopes grew in 1621. Governor. William Bradford decreed that December 13, 1621 be set aside as a day of feasting and prayer to show the gratitude of the colonists that they were still

--- The custom of Thanksgiving spread from Plymouth to other New England colonies. During the Revolutionary War, eight special days of thanksgiving were observed. On November 26, 1789 President George Washington issued a general proclamation for a day of thanks. In the same year, the Episcopal Church announced that the first Thursday in November would be the regular -day for giving thanks unless another day was designated by civil

For many years there was no national Thanksgiving Day. Some states had a holiday; others did not. New York had the first official Northern day and Virginia was the first Southern state to follow this example in 1855. Mrs. Sarah Hale, editor of God-

1863 ,Lincoln proclaimed the last noon. making it a legal holiday. Happy Thanksgiving!
