#### WHAT IS IN STORE FOR US IN 1963?

An Editorial

This is a question that many of us would like to know all of the answers to. So far, we haven't met anyone who would attempt to foretell the answer to many questions we would like answered.

However there are several things that we do know

are happening or are about to happen.

We know that 1963 was ushered in with one of the most severe cold snaps and bad weather in our neck of the woods that a lot of us can remember as a New Year's Greeting.

We also know that there is bound to be a general rise in prices of almost everything we purchase. Why?

On January 1, Social Security taxes rise once more. Both employees and employers will pay at the rate of three and five eighths per cent on earnings up to \$4,800. The self-employed rate will be 5.4 per cent on earnings to the same figure. Additional increases are scheduled, by law, for 1966 and 1968.

Also, in the very near future we'll be paying an additional penny to mail a letter as well as increases in the rates charged for other classes of postal matter. (Which includes us-namely our newspaper.)

These were authorized by Congress in an effort to do something about the postal deficit, which has been running in the vicinity of \$700 million a year. Past increases in rates were offset by well-deserved

pay raises given to postal workers. It remains to be seen just how big a dent in the deficit the pending new charges accomplish. At best, however, post office operating losses will continue at huge levels. It is entirely unlikely that there is any way to entirely eliminate them and, at the same time, carry out the department's historical functions of contributing to public knowledge, enlightenment, etc.

However, the government has shown too great a reluctance to place the department's purely commercial and competitive service, which is parcel post, on a solvent basis. It is, and long has been, a costly liability to the department. More over, the public enlight-enment argument, which applies to carrying letters newspapers and magazines, certainly doesn't apply.

So—it looks as if yet another step, beyond these

coming rate increases, needs to be taken.

What do all these seemingly tiny little incidentals mean to us as an average little taxpayer? Just thisevery business that has to pay these additional costs is going to have to tack them on to the selling price.

Guess who is going to end up paying for the full amount of these small rises—None other than Mr. and

Mrs. John Q. Taxpayer!

At the federal level, we hear much talk of income tax reduction—though how this can be accomplished, in the light of eight or ten billion dollar annual deficits without shrinking the dollar's buying power farther, is a question that would have stumped Socrates or even Solomon. This, besides other federal plans, now in the press-on-regardless stage, call for a myriad of changes in tax policy that would subject individual and business taxpayers alike—to an almost endless series of expensive irritations, and bury us under a flood of tax forms.

At the state and even county level, for the most part, a mad search for more tax revenues for welfare services, for highways, for schools, and for just about anything else anyone can dream up. Most vicious of all—is the scheme, now in effect in some states, and planned by others—whereby federal income taxes are not allowed as a credit against state income taxes. Thus, the taxpayer pays a tax upon a tax, on money which he never really had at all.

Who can foresee the end unless WE, THE PEOPLE, stop demanding more and more services from each level of government-from Village, Town and County right up thru; AND also demand a cut-back in expenditures in each of these separate branches, from our elected political representatives.
