LIVING UNDER LAW

EXCESSIVE BAIL

Under both the federal and state constitutions no court can set "excessive bail." As a rule, courts set bail, which is a forfeit and not a punishment, to make sure the accused appears for trial.
One appellate court found that one judge had set bail too high in order to punish a man accused of drunkenness for asking for a jury trial.
The judge's costs reduced to \$100.
The man's name came to court charged with being drunk in a public place.

"Td lika to know," said the man.

"Well, you are going to get 90 days in jail."
Then the judge set bail for \$500 instead of the usual \$25 as scheduled in such cases.
Unable to post \$500, the man went back to his cell. But he asked the appeals court for a Writ of Habeas Corpus. He claimed he was wrongfully in jail because his bail was so excessive he could not pay it up. Besides, he said, he was being punished for asking for his right to a jury trial as guaranteed by the Constitution.
When the prisoner asked to pay the bail, the judge said he would not accept it because the man had no money and the judge was not to set his bail so high.
