300 New York Hunters Bagged Wild Turkey

An estimated 300 New York hunters bagged a wild turkey this fall during the State's six-day open season in four southern tier counties, the Conservation Department has announced.

The season, which ran October 22-27, was limited to Allegany, Cattaraugus, Chautauque, and Steuben counties, where a huntable variety of the once extinct game bird has been successfully established through a trapping and restocking program carried out by the Department's Division of Fish and Game.

This marked the fourth consecutive year that a limited gunning season has been held on wild turkeys in New York State. The 300 turkeys taken by sportsmen this year erased the previous season high of 250 set in 1961.

Regional Game Manager, Howard Bobseine of Olean, credited the 20 per cent increase in take to excellent tracking snow that existed throughout much of the hunting season and the introduction of Saturday hunting. Previous seasons which lasted three to five days, were limited to weekend only.

According to Albert G. Hall, Chief of the Department's Bureau of Game, this year's "harvest" represents less than ten percent of the region's calculated spring population—a figure well below what is considered a safe huntable margin.

Based on a growing wild turkey population in western New York and increased interest on the part of sportsmen to hunt the big game bird, Hall predicted a considerable increase in take in the future.

"During the first seasons, most hunters found turkeys only by accident," he said. "With increased know-how and specialization, New York turkey hunters can be expected to improve their present success ratio."

The firm of James A. Lobred & Co., of Washington, D. C., assisted in the negotiations for this acquisition.

Alvin G. Cornelius, 81, lifelong resident of the Alfred area, died unexpectedly Tuesday morning December 25, 1962, at the home of his son, Morris, in Cheektowaga, where he was visiting.
Mr. Cornelius operated his own farm in the Town of Alfred for many years, prior to his retirement 10 years ago.

There are 97 survivors direct descendants — six children, 26 grandchildren and 66 great grandchildren. The survivors include his wife, Mrs. Hattie Cornelius of Wellsville; the son at Cheektowaga, and five daughters: Miss Evelyn Cornelius and Mrs. Elmer DeRoo, both of Canisteo; Mrs. Ruth Hall, a resident of Texas; Mrs. Lila Cook, Wellsville and Mrs. Vivian Patterson of Anaheim, Calif.

Also surviving are one brother, Elmer of Alfred Station, and several nieces, nephews and cousins.
