Notice To Owners And Harborers Of Dogs

Dog licenses for 1962 expired on December 31, 1962. The 1963 license fee was due January 1st. Licenses so issued will cover the period from January to December 31, 1963. Every dog must wear a tag of the current dog license year. A dog without such a tag is not protected by law and no action can be maintained for his injury or destruction.

An unlicensed dog, must be seized and killed and the fact that a dog is without a tag is presump-

dog is without a tag is presump-ive evidence that the dog is un-

Dog licenses must be obtained from the clerk of the city or town where the dog is harbored or

License fees: Male Dog, \$2.25;
Female Dog, \$5.25; Spayed Female Dog, \$2.25.

No license can be issued for less than the full license year.

The owner of a dog, who fails or refuses to obtain a license for the dog as required by law incurs a penalty of \$10.00 and costs.

The enumerators of towns and the police department of cities are required to prepare in January of each year a list of dog owners. The omission of the name of an owner from such lists will not excuse the owner from obtaining a license.

STILL A THREAT Deaths from smallpox, typhoid

dintheria, tetanus hear tragic reports of illness and death from these diseases. Tuber-culosis, too, which some people wrongly consider under control and no longer a threat, continues to wait silently for the opportune time to strike its next victim. Each year, tuberculosis takes more 10,000 lives and claims 55,000 victims. Today in the United States alone, there are between 30 and 40 million people with TB germs in their bodies. Over two million of them have actually been ill with the disease. Two million more of them will break down with the disease sometime during their

the disease sometime uning their lives.

Tuberculiosis is caused by a germ that can be easily spread from one person to another. A person with active tuberculosis sneezes or coughs and sends the germs into the air. The germ go everywhere, can infect anyone, at any age. More city people get tuberculosis than country dwellers. Overcrowding, poor housing, improper diet—these are the living conditions under which TB flourishes. But the well-fed, and well housed get TB too. So do suburbanites and country folk. As long as there are people walking around with active TB and not being treated, nobody is safe.

Today we have an effective drug

Today we have an effective drug treatment for TB. The disease could be wiped out if every active case could be found and treated.

The tuberculin test signals the presence of TB germs. But infection doesn't mean active disease. That can be found only through chest X-rays and laboratory tests. Since anyone can have active TB and not know it, it's smart to get a tuberculin test every year, and if the test is positive, a chest X-ray.

An artificial Heart is being tested in the chest cavities of animals at the Cleveland Clinic. External air pressure actuates a double-ond cylinder which pumps blood from the heart chamber. This pisten-type heart is said to effer important atvantages over testing currently being evaluated.
