Woodland Management Meeting

The income from the acres of woodland on a property or farm could be increased considerably through improved management says Larry Davis, Asst. County Agricultural Agent.

Prof. Alex Dickson, specialist in woodland management, Department of Conservation, Cornell University, will discuss principles of hardwood management and income that can be expected at a meeting Thursday, January 17 at 1:15 p. m. The meeting will be held at the Home Demonstration Workroom, Belmont.

An interesting case history slide presentation will be used to illustrate many of the points to be discussed.

Attention Commercial Motor Vehicle Owners

Owners of commercial, special commercial, trailer and farm vehicles are reminded by the Department of Motor Vehicles that they may not operate the vehicles on the highway after midnight, next Tuesday, January 15, unless they display a 1963 validating tab.

The tab, which shows a "63" in orange on a black background, must be attached to the lower righthand corner of the rear 1962 number plate, covering the "62". It is illegal to fasten the tab elsewhere on the plate.

Special commercial vehicles get a tab which is all red instead of the standard orange and black color combination. This is to readily permit identification of the special commercial vehicle by law enforcement officers.

For the convenience of the public, Commissioner William S. Huits has directed all district offices of the Department that issue registrations to be open until noon on the next three Saturday mornings—January 12, 19 and 26—for the sale of registrations only. County Clerks have been requested to be open the same hours, if they deem it advisable.

Owners of passenger cars and motorcycles have until midnight Thursday, January 31, before they display 1963 tabs.
