\$4.36 Paid For December Milk

New York, Jan. 15—A uniform farm price of \$4.36 per hundred-weight will be paid for December milk deliveries to pool handlers in the New York-New Jersey milk-shed, Dr. C. J. Blanford, market administrator, announced today. Dairy farmers got \$4.54 in November! \$4.44 per hundredweight was paid in December, 1961.

The producer butterfat differential was computed at 5.6 cents for each tenth of a pound of far above or below the 3.5 percent

above or below the 3.5 percent standard.

standard.
In announcing the price, Dr.
Blanford reported that receipts
from producers in December rose
by 73,533, 591 pounds, from the
previous year and that consumetion of fluid milk was up by 13,-212,396, or 2.86 percent.

The farm value of the Decem-

her production amounted to \$42, 807,605.87. Dr. Blanford pointed 807,605.87. Dr. Blanford nointed out that this figure does not include all the differentials paid to dairy farmers.
