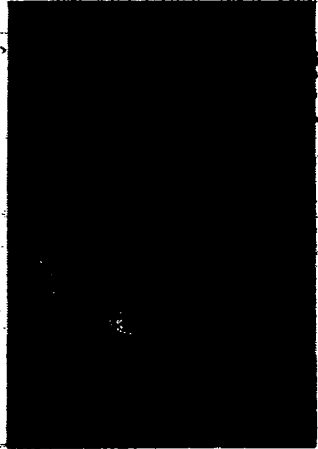


## James F. Mulholland Receives Funeral Directors License

## \$4.36 Paid For December Milk

New York, Jan. 15—A uniform farm price of \$4.36 per hundredweight will be paid for December milk deliveries to pool handlers in the New York-New Jersey milkshed, Dr. C. J. Blanford, market administrator, announced today. Dairy farmers got \$4.54 in November; \$4.44 per hundredweight was paid in December, 1961.

The producer butterfat differential was computed at 5.6 cents for each tenth of a pound of fat above or below the 3.5 percent standard.

In announcing the price, Dr. Blanford reported that receipts from producers in December rose by 73,533, 591 pounds, from the previous year and that consumption of fluid milk was up by 13,212,396, or 2.86 percent.

The farm value of the December production amounted to \$42,807,605.87. Dr. Blanford pointed out that this figure does not include all the differentials paid to dairy farmers.
