Teen Talk

The problem of students dropping out of school is growing worse. One out of three students

worse. One out of three students arop out of school.

For jobs nowadays, you must have at least a high school education and for most jobs, you must have additional education. By 1970, now more than 5% of all available jobs will be of the unskilled variety.

About 175,000 girls, each year, are dropping out of school to get married. Many young people's capabilities are lost annually because these young people are discouraged.

these young people are discouraged.

Reading is the fundamental educational skill. Without it no one can do well in any subject. Drop-outs fail three times as courses as those who stay in school. Nine out of every tendrop-outs have had to repeat at least one year in some grade.

Seventy-five persent of the drop outs score an IQ above 90 and 13% of the drop-outs had the IQ scores above 110 so they are by no means illiterate.

Tost drop-outs come from families of lower socio-economic catagories, families where the father is missing, cultural background is limited, or where education is viewed with indifference or distinct in not all their fault.

Another reason students drop-outs of school is lack of social life.

Another reason students drop-out of school is lack of social life. These student are much more-dis-satisfied with their social relation-ship in school then were the norsatisfied with their social relationship in school than were the non-leavers. Girls are especially sensifive to snubs and lacking the right clothes. Researcher's have found that students who leave school don't take part in outside activities because they are rejected by other students or lack of money.


