This brings the total to at least 3 that we know of for the month of January! Seems that some kind of warning sign should be put up that would be very conspicuous and outstanding well ahead of each approach curve to the overhead bridge, so that motorists unfamiliar with the road would have plenty of time to slow would have plenty of time to slow down. Also, judging from the ac-cident reports, it wouldn't do any harm to have more sand spread on these dangerous curves and blind snots in this area on our State Highways.

Speaking of dangerous spots reminds us that we heard of a very near tragedy that occurred on the Main Street Railroad Crossing. A little girl on her way home from school for lunch went to cross school for lunch went to cross the tracks, looked up to see the 11:30 passenger train bearing flown on her, and froze there on the middle of the crossing. Needless to say, the parents of the little girl are very than ful for the quick unhesitant actions of the young man and are pretty
