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Wellsville Woman Dies In Local Auto Crash

A Wellsville woman was killed early last Friday morning in an auto accident at the overhead which involved a local motorist.

Miss Dolores K. Allen, 52, Clark St., Wellsville, was pronounced dead on arrival at the Jones Memorial Hospital. A certificate of accidental death due to a fractured skull was issued by Dr. Frederick McCarty, Allegany Co., Coroner.

Virgil Billings, 44, of R.D. 2, Andover, driver of the other car was not hospitalized immediately after the crash although it is reported that he went to the hospital later that day for a check-up.

State Police from the Wellsville Substation investigated the accident and reported that the Allen auto was traveling East towards Andover, rounding a curve to the right near the Hyland property approaching the overhead, when it skidded on slippery hard-packed snow.

The car traveled across the highway, struck some guard rails and careened into the path of the Westbound Billings car.

Miss Allen was thrown from the auto, and according to bystanders at the scene of the accident, it was necessary to move the car in order to get her out from underneath it, although the car was on its wheels.

The victim was on her way to work in Almond where she has been employed at the Almond Upholstery Company for several years when the accident occurred.

She was born in Angelica April 17, 1924, a daughter of Henry Allen, and the late Bethel Willis Allen, and resided in Wellsville for the past 27 years, where she was a member of the Methodist Church.

Surviving besides her father are two brothers, Bernard J. Allen of 60 Clark St., and Wesley D. Allen, Columbia, N. J.; an aunt, and two uncles, and four nieces.

Funeral services were held at the Embser Funeral Home in Wellsville at 1:30 p. m. Monday, Rev. Joseph Shipman officiating, with burial in Woodlawn Cemetery.

News That's Print To Fit

It certainly seems too bad to see one accident after another happen at the overhead without anything being done about it.

Normally, we who live around here and are familiar with the road, are careful when we approach the overhead from both directions especially during the winter months so don't think too much about the situation.

Yet, last Friday morning—a woman who has been driving over this same road every day to work—still cracked up there and was killed.

Earlier this month we know of a Binghamton man driving a white '62 Chrysler, who cracked up at about the same spot with the car rolling over onto its top, and then this past Tuesday another Binghamton motorist smashed up the car that she was driving—again at the same spot.

This brings the total to at least 3 that we know of for the month of January! Seems that some kind of warning sign should be put up that would be very conspicuous and outstanding well ahead of each approach curve to the overhead bridge, so that motorists unfamiliar with the road would have plenty of time to slow down. Also, judging from the accident reports, it wouldn't do any harm to have more sand spread on these dangerous curves and blind spots in this area on our State Highways.

Speaking of dangerous spots reminds us that we heard of a very near tragedy that occurred on the Main Street Railroad Crossing. A little girl on her way home from school for lunch went to cross the tracks, looked up to see the 11:30 passenger train bearing down on her, and froze there in the middle of the crossing. Alerted by the screams of her older sister, a near by High School lad saw the little girl's predicament, and made a mad dash to carry her and himself clear of the path of the onrushing train.

Needless to say, the parents of the little girl are very thankful for the quick unhesitant actions of the young man and are pretty sure that it won't happen again in their family. However how about other children in other families?

With the ERIE changing the time of this fast passenger train so that when it is late it coincides with the children's lunch hour at noon, it seems as if something should be done to prevent a tragedy before someone has to lose their life there.

So far, we know of one woman that lost her life at this same crossing not too long ago and we would certainly hate to see a child's life be destroyed if it could be prevented.

We feel that if the Railroad were to put up a crossing gate that this would minimize the danger at this spot.

The flashing signals at the Main Street Crossing could then be put in at the crossing above near the Ponds thereby eliminating that danger spot also since we hear that a local man was almost struck there with his car this past week.

The visibility is very poor on that curve and with no warning signals there it is a very dangerous spot during the winter months. Then too with varying weather conditions it is sometimes very difficult to hear the train whistle inside a car until it is almost on top of you.

It seems that if the Erie would nut a gate in at the foot of Pennsylvania Hill, they would do the same thing here in Andover if they were made aware of the existing danger with the change in their time schedule.

We see that some of the slippy spots in the Village Streets were sanded last Friday and that Streets were again sanded after this past snow fall was plowed off over the week-end. Let's hope
