## Edition: 1876

While browsing among the dusty volumes in an antique shop, now a part of my room's furnishings, I came across an old paper, dated 1876. Although the top was partially cropped, I was able to recognize the title, "Cricket On The Hearth", the publishers: Frank M. Lupton, Stuart H. Moore and J. Victor Wilson, and the editor, Peter Snow. The paper, published in New York City, constituted the backing for an obscure picture, which was lying, obliterated, within one of the desk's "pigeon-holes".

With the aid of a magnifying glass, I am able to scrutinize the contents of the paper. Carefully turning the pages, I find that the paper consists of short stories, serials, poems, popular songs, tips on fashions, advertising, crossword and other types of puzzles, medical advice, and other interesting reading material. Perhaps the most interesting parts are the hand-drawn illustrations. Several advertisements and the main features have sketches, probably of pen and in execution, which add to the aura of archaicism surrounding the paper.

One particular article which draws my attention is that concerning the time at which a lover should depart. It is the opinion of this paper that, when the sounds of the older man putting on his boots and tucking in his "shirttail" are audible, it is the proper time to hastily bid adieu.

The fellows would be interesting in knowing, I think, that a seven shot revolver, "Tramp's Terror", and a hundred cartridges could be purchased, in 1876, for the price of three dollars. A steel saw is advertised at one dollar and twenty-five cents. The editor, under farm and household interests, informs readers on methods of controlling shying horses, using a grindstone, and increase egg production by adding cayenne pepper to hen's feed.

The entirety of this paper could not be circumscribed in one article. The reading material does, however, provide hours of entertainment for those who enjoy retrospection.

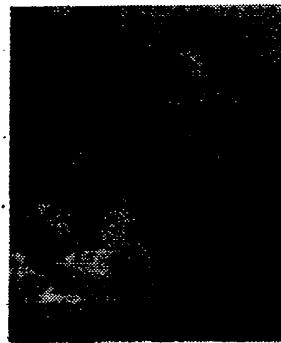
