Local Police Car Involved In Rear-end Collision

The accident occurred on Rochambeau Ave., as Officer Baker brought the Police Car to a stop prior to driving it into Police Chief Fred Middaugh's driveway.

According to the Police Report, Mr. Gavin was driving West on Rochambeau Ave., and after crossing the new bridge, saw the stop

Due to the glare ice condition on the street, he was unable to stop and plowed into the back of the police car driving it up on a pile of snow at the further corner of the Middeugh driveway approach, with
