Coach Barden explains that diving, is a highly complicated sport and requires much concentration. Unlike other sports, diving does not become a habit, but must be consumity practiced.

There are four kinds of dives: pike, layout, tuck, and free. Andpike, layout, tuck, and free. Andover has a one-meter board and dives on it range from about 1.2 to 2.6 in difficulty. There are two or more judges who rate dives from one to ten. The diver's score is found by multiplying the difficulty of the dive by his rating by the judges. Each diver must do five dives from the five different series, forward dives, back dives, twist dives, inward dives and reverse dives. The judges choose one dive and the diver chooses four from each of the other categories.
