February Forebodings It's an ordinary February, not a Leap Year!

It means one less day of winter's wear and tear: fewer ankles broken on slippery pavements, a slight decrease in fainting spells received from shoveling snow, and one less 24 hour period in which to catch a Respiratory Disease.

It winter health is precured used to be ideadly—one out of used to be deadly—one but of every four cases facal, it can still kill, but the advent of marcillin and other antibiories plus early, proper treatment makes the disease much less frightening, and the cure much more possible.

Pneumonia attacks mainly in

Lobar pneumonia, which infects the entire lobe or section of the lung, is caused by bacteria. The disease hits suddenly, sending the temperature soaring, and otherwise making the patient know he's really sick. wise making really sick.

Bronchopneumonia has various Bronchopneumonia has various causes—including bactera, viruses physical injuries, fungo—and instead of involving an entire lung section attacks only the small root ends of the bronchial tubes, or breathing passages. The disease hits less violently than lobar pneu-monia, but its tendency to relapse may in the long run, be more dangerous.

As with many other Respiratory Diseases, the prevention of pneu-monia depends largely on general good health. Pneumonia strikes where resistance is lowered by such things as bad diet, fatigue, or care-less health habits. Your tubercu-lo.is association points out the importance of practicing good health principles in order to throw off serious infection when it threatens
