Redmond Goodno of Buffalo came Friday and was an overnight guest of his mother, Mrs. J. H. Goodno.

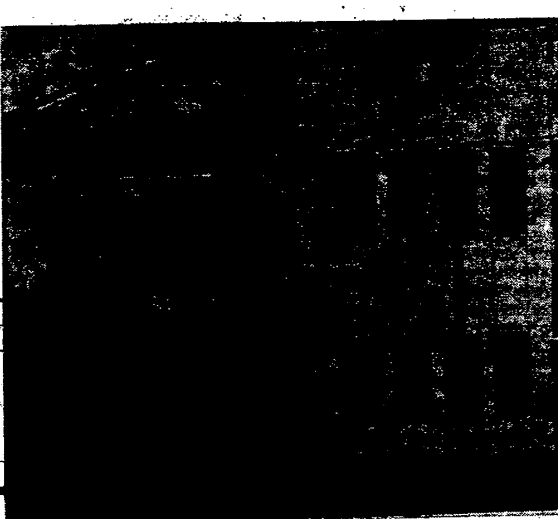
Mrs. Mildred Allen of Friendship was a Monday evening caller of her sister, Mrs. Pearl Bassett.

Stanley Murray was called to investigate an accident Saturday night by the Clarence Stephens farm where a car was crowded off the road and two men sent to the hospital.

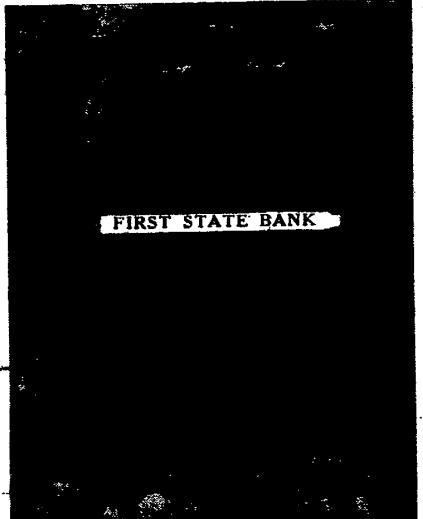
