It was revealed that 487 women had paid dues to date. The quota is 669. Only one unit Andover, has reached its individual goal. The first Protestant religious services held in Western New York were held May 1, 1797, in a home near Almond, according to re-

search information compiled by Mrs. Hazel M. Shear, Allegany County Historian. The service was conducted by the Andrew Gray residence, Mrs. Shear states, Last December Mrs. Shear submitted a paper on her findings to Albert B. Corey, state historian in the Division of Archives and History. The contents of her article were subsequently read at a meeting of the Allegany Board of Supervisors as well as a letter from Corey stating that "beyond a reasonable doubt" the facts in her paper were correct. Mrs. Shear urged that a site should be purchased to mark the first service and that a memorial would benefit the county and all of Western New York as a historic remembrance.

Allegany County will have a Class B-C scholastic basketball league next year. The proposal was approved at a recent meeting of the Allegany County High School Athletic Association. At the same time, Scio moves up to Class C competition next season to join Fillmore, Andover, Belmont, Bolivar, Cuba and Friendship in the

Class B-C League. The league will have an over-all winner and also a Class C winner.

The Erie-Lackawanna Railroad crews were busy cleaning the railroad's tracks of the wreckage of 35 cars which left the tracks two miles southwest of Belfast Monday morning. The cars were part of a 134-car train en route to Hornell from Salamanca. About 100 sheep out of a shipment of 200 were killed when the double-deck car carrying them overturned. State Police at Belfast said they were forced to destroy a few of the injured animals. No personal injuries were reported. Until service was restored on the freight line, the railroad rerouted freight trans over passenger tracks, via Cuba, Wellsville into Hornell. The surviving 100 sheep were cared for at a nearby farm.
