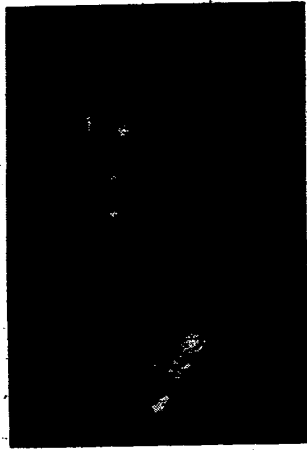
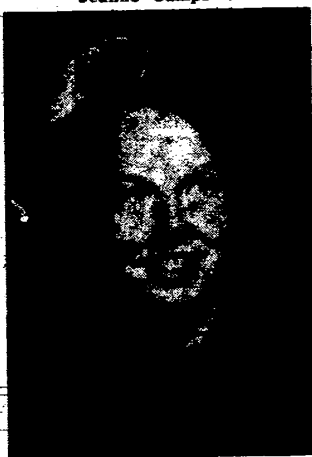


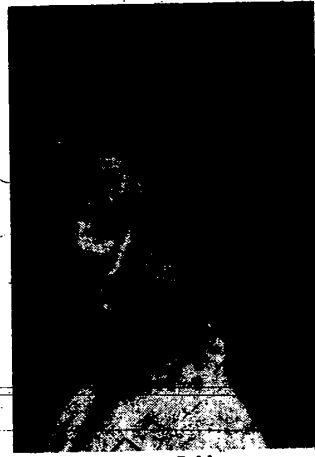

Four Andover Central School Seniors have won New York State Scholarships. They are Jeanne Campbell, Valedictorian; James Greene, Salutatorian; Alice Gross; and Lynn Cable.

Jeanne Campbell, James Greene and Alice Gross have won Regents College Scholarships. They will be entitled to an annual award of \$250 to \$700, depending on financial need, for each of four years of their college course, while attending any college of New York approved by the Regents for this purpose. In addition, they may be eligible to receive scholar incentive awards of \$100 to \$300, up to the cost of tuition.

Lynn Cable received a special New York State scholarship provided for children of deceased or disabled members of the Armed Forces of the United States. This entitles her to \$450 a year for the next four years in any approved college or university located within New York State selected by the scholarship winner.

Lynn Sootheran and Emily Alford are second and fourth alternates respectively for New York State Regents Scholarships.

In the Nursing Scholarships, Janet Burger is a fourth alternate and Carol Peckham is a fifth alternate. Other alternates for the Nursing Scholarships are Cathy Caple, Lynne Carmody and Connie Meyn.

Local Post To Observe 44th Legion Birthday

American Legionnaires of the Lynch-Burgett Post No. 397 here, in Andover will join their nearly three million comrades of more than 16,000 posts throughout the nation and overseas in a gigantic birthday celebration, March 15-17, Post Commander John R. Gavin, announced today.

The celebration will mark the 44th anniversary of The American Legion which was established in 1919 at a caucus, attended by representatives of American Expeditionary Force units, in Paris, France.

Local point of the gala anniversary observation in Andover will be a birthday party on the night of Wednesday, March 13th at the Legion Home, Commander Gavin said.

A portion of the birthday celebration will be devoted to a brief report covering the programs of the post during the past year, the Korean Bonus, and what the American Legion means to the Veteran.

"We have been asked by National Commander James E. Powers to make our 1963 birthday celebration an 'American Legion Showcase' in order to display the participation by Post No. 397 in the Legion's four great programs—Americanism, Child Welfare, Rehabilitation, and National Security—which are the foundation of the Legion and which have played such an important role in its growth and success."

Membership in The American Legion is restricted to honorably discharged veterans of World War I, World War II, and the Korean Conflict. Present membership for 1963 of the local post stands at 97. Any eligible veteran for membership in the American Legion is urged to attend this dinner.

Andover Mermen Win Last Meet 62-31

Last Saturday evening Andover's well conditioned swimmers rolled up a score of 62 to 31 against a larger but outclassed Lakemont team.

One of the chronic problems endured by all coaches is convincing their boys of the importance of hard training. Physical endurance and strength seems to increase only when brought under continual stress.

A very strong example of this theory was illustrated last Saturday evening when Andover swam against Lakemont Academy. At first appearance Lakemont's boys seemed very threatening. They were much larger in stature than our boys and should have been a strong team. It was but a short time before it was evident that regardless of their size, Lakemont was not in condition physically to cope with the rigors of competitive swimming.

After the meet when it was possible to talk with the Lakemont Coach, it was discovered that the Lakemont team can only practice one day a week. Next year they will have a pool of their own and consequently should come up with a fine team.

It is hoped that the swimmers and potential swimmers of Andover Central School will always remember the first meet with Lakemont Academy. When they find their coach yelling, jumping up and down and driving them to
