Red Cross Urges Care With Poisons

To stem the rising tide of accidental poisonings of small children, the American Red Cross today urged parents to take the utmost precautions to keep poisons substances beyond their children's reach.

The Red Cross is one of 21 member-organizations of the National Poisoning Council for National Poison Prevention Week, proclaimed by President Kennedy for the week beginning March 17.

"According to Council estimates there are 500,000 accidental poisonings a year among children five years old and younger," said Mrs. James Thorton, First Aid Chairman for the Allegany County Red Cross Chapter. "Proper safeguards by parents could have prevented most of these accidents, of which some 500 were fatal."

She recommended these measures to prevent small children from swallowing household items which are poisonous:

- 1. Lock up drugs, insecticides, detergents, and cleaning materials, or store them well beyond child-

ren's reach. Remember that children learn to climb at an early age—before they can tell the difference between harmless and harmful substances.

2. Return the dangerous items to their customary storage places immediately after using.

3. Keep harmful household items in their original containers. Do not transfer them to mason jars, milk or soft drink bottles.

4. Children are imitative—do not take medicines in their presence.

5. In administering medicines to children, refer to them as "medicine," not "andy." Always take or give medicines in well lighted rooms and always read the label first.

6. When the illness for which a medicine was prescribed is over, dispose of the remaining medicine by flushing it down the drain. Rinse the container thoroughly before discarding.
