## Editorial

**How To Be Unpopular**

Hundreds of books, containing thousands of helpful hints, have been written to help today's teenager become more popular. Combining some of the most accurate hints yields a guaranteed recipe for becoming popular. However, there is a corresponding recipe, which is equally guaranteed, for becoming unpopular. It contains four essential ingredients.

The first of these ingredients is self-centeredness. All a teenager need to do is to continuously come to school and talk of his accomplishments, and of his outstanding ability. If he maintains this atmosphere of braggadocio, and allows it to simmer, the first ingredient will have been added to the boiling pot.

Next, he must blend in a little insincerity. When this teenager momentarily ceases talking about himself, the few words he says about others must be shallow and insincere. With these four ingredients at hand, anyone who religiously follows the recipe can easily obtain suitable results. People will most assuredly distrust and dislike you. So if you're in the market for a lonely, self-centered life, try this recipe, which carries a life-long guarantee on how to be unpopular.

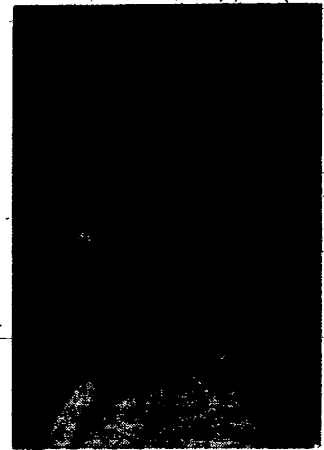
