#### Maple Season Getting Off To Late Start

Tapping trees for maple sap by our local syrup producers is just getting under way because of the deep snow in the sugar bush, and veral weeks behind the normal

Local farmers report that it has LOOM lathers report that it has been necessary to use buildozers and caterpillar tractors to clear some of the roads into the sugaring area with a few producers saying that they are thankful they still have horses to haul the collections.

We talked to most of the local men and report their comments on

Cliff Burdick has around 1,600 trees tapped with around 300 more buckets to hang yet. The sap is running good in places and the buckets are running over but with waist high snow in places it is very hard to gather. This year he has three evaporators in operation and so far has boiled off around 27 gallons.

Gordon Pease is reported to have his bush pretty well tapped

have his bush pretty well tapped and has already produced over 40

gallons of syrup.

The Brewster Brothers gallons of syrup.

The Brewster Brothers are petty well tapped by now and are trying the plastic pipe system where ever possible. They report that some of their neighbors gave them an assist in opening the roads in the woods with caterpillar treads on their tractor, since the snow was too deep to get around in otherwise.

We understand that Art Mills on the former Charile Scott farm

on the former Charlle Scott farm has tapped this year and has ac-quired quite a bit of equipment; and that Neil McCormick not only tapped but has already done some boiling off. Paul Hyland tells us that he has

one bush tapped but can't reach snow, and so far hasn't had much

of a run.
Del Gayhart says that the snow is 2 to 3 feet deep in the woods. He has partially tapped and taken off 1, boiling which produced a few gallons but still has more trees to be tapped. In one day's hauling in of the sap he says that he meneded to get stuck around he managed to get stuck around 12 times which makes it hard on the equipment as well as the disposition.

The Hulse Boys have tapped this year for the first time and have boiled some off but we were unable to contact them for further information.

The York Brothers report that they tapped and gathered enough sap the first week to produce about 50 gallons of syrup. They report that it is very difficult in wading thru the snow and breaking a track as some of the snow is around 3 feet deep in their woods on the shady side.

#### Sectional Swimming Results By "Al" Barden

We are not ashamed of our results in the Section 5 Champion Swimming Meet, held in the University of Rochester Pool.

Before I reveal how the boys made out, I would like to explain the type of competition that faced them. In Section 5, there are over 100 schools and over 10 different swimming leagues.

Last Friday night all entries were required to swim against the clock to see if they could qualify and thus return Saturday night for the finals. There were 186 boys trying to qualify Friday night boys trying to qualify Friday night and of all these boys—only 58 would be allowed to swim in the finals.

The first night, luck was both with and against us. Our Medley Relay Meet was in good shape and finished well inside the required time, but unfortunately was dis-qualified because of a bad turn. This is something which can hap-pen to the best of teams.

At the end of the evening, three of our boys had qualified for the finals. Bruce Johnson in the 50 yard freestyle; Bob McGillivray in the 100 yard butterfly; and Jeff Common in the 400 yard freestyle. Saturday night, Bob McGillivray placed fourth in his event which was good considering the heavy competition he was faced with.

Bruce Johnson placed second in a heart rendering race, by losing first place by one tenth of one second. The judges finally decided that the winning time was 23.1 seconds while Bruce's time was 25.2 seconds for the course.

When the results were finally analyzed, it was discovered that the Andover entry had broken the new record set the night before by the Fairport youth, but in this final race he had come back and set a new record. The times were 4:50.4 for the first place and 4:53.2 for Jeff's time.
