The search for a doctor to locate in the Greenwood area, start-ed in 1959 still goes on. Last-night a representative committee again met for the first time in several months to review what had

been done and to discuss what

further steps could be taken.
Virgil Hussey, Committee Chairman, geported to the committee the results of over 50 contacts,

the results of over 50 contacts, none of which were successful.

However, one person has indicated some interest in the area and has sought additional information according to Hussey. Further contact will be made and steps taken to encourage this physician to consider the prospects.

In its deliberations last night, the committee voiced an opinion that in order to eventually be suc-cessful in the search that some form of inducement from the communities involved would be necesmunities involved would be necessary. At such time as an individual may be located, it might be possible by public subscription to raise sufficient funds to establish an office on a modest scale. It was the committee's opinion that it would be an investment with unfailing dividends.

The area has been without the The area has been without the services of a physician since the death of Dr. L. T. Hardenbergh in 1958. The surrounding area including the villages of Jasper, Troupsburg, Whitesville, and Andover should be a fertile field for a physician established centrally in the area. All these communities, except Andover, are without services of a physician at the present. Dr. F. B. MacDonald, of Woodhull, graciously extends his services into graciously extends his services into graciously extends his services into Troupsburg and Jasper whenever possible. It was pointed out to the committee that public service to the schools and towns involved would in itself serve as a background for establishing a good office for a general practitioner, while building up a practice.
