HALL OF FAME

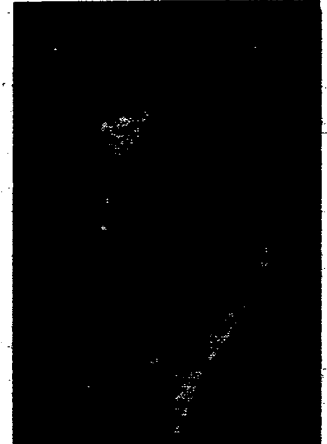
