Red Cross News

The American Red Cross expended \$99,388,635 during the 1961-62 fiscal year, marking the third largest peacetime fiscal year expenditure in the organization's

expenditure in the organization shistory.

As in every year since the United States entered World War II, the biggest single item in Red Expenditures—\$36,389,009 or 36.6 percent of the total—was for Services to the Armed Forces and Veterans and their families, reported Edward Mergler, Chairman Allegany County Chapter, in releasing the expenditure figures.

Basing his information on the

leasing the expenditure figures.

Basing his information on the current Red Cross Annual Report now being distributed, Mr. Mergler revealed that the second highest expenditure, \$13,420,745, or 13.5 percent was for collecting, processing and distributing whole blood and such components as gamma globulin, serum albumen and fibrinogen.

13 percent of the total was expended for disaster relief. Other health and nursing and—safety training programs accounted for 8.2 percent of the total.

The balance of the expenditures

The balance of the expenditures went for such activities as student services, services to the 3600 American Red Cross Chapters by the National organization, community services by chapters, membership enrollment and fund raising, public information, and plan-ning and administration by both the national organizations and

chapters.

Thes eexpenditures reflect not only the mounting health and welfare needs of people at home and around the world, but also the vitality of the Red Cross.

An all-time high, the report shows, was marked up in the num-ber of certificates awarded for completion of ARC water safety training courses. New high marks for a peacetime year were set in blood collections and in first aid training. A sharp increase was recorded in foreign disaster aid and in technical assistance to other national Red Cross societies.

In the report, the Red Cross "acknowledges its debt both to the individuals and to the organizations that work seriously and steadfastly to keep their Red Cross prepared to serve people across the nation and throughout the world."
