A GOOD SCHOOL NEWSPAPER

Students Attend Agricultural Science Youth Program at Cornell

Six students from Andover attended the New York State College of Agriculture at Cornell University on March 26th for a day of lectures and demonstrations in a special Agricultural Science Youth Program.

The students, who were accompanied by vocational agriculture teacher Mr. Russell, are: Gail Burdick, Gene and Joe Raub, Mike Baker, Bob Gayhart and Bob Goodridge.

They are among 2000 students from 150 high schools throughout the State who will take part in this special program designed to help high school youth develop a broader understanding of the term agriculture, learn of the many professional opportunities in the field, and see the possibilities of an agricultural education.

Conducted by nine departments in the College, the program features small group participation sessions on such topics as how a milking machine works, analysis of a farm business problem, the New York State College of Agriculture, making better forage seedings, do your electric arc welds hold, and why people behave the way they do.

Each student attended your lectures offered by selected faculty members. Advisors were available to counsel students on college entrance requirements.

Jim has been a member of the United Presbyterian Youth Fellowship for four years, being vice moderator for two years. He has

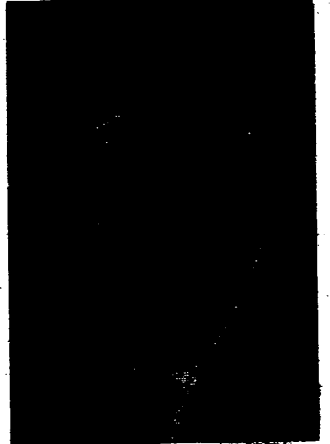
also sung in the church choir for four years.
