Allegheny County Civil Defense

The New York State Civil Defense Commission has recently announced their interest and support of a recent program initiated by the American Medical Association to encourage physicians to vaccinate or revaccinate their patients against smallpox and to urge the public to go to their physicians for this purpose. The American Medical Association has undertaken this because "the declining immunization level of the American public has reached a dangerous

low." The interest of Civil Defense is obvious as smallpox epidemics beginning in a shelter or after an attack could be catastrophic and complicate the situation terrifically. The emphasis on this vaccination or revaccination is for adults, since school programs adequately cover the child population. Revaccination at five-year intervals is essential to maintain immunity.

Robert L. Coulter stated that he felt the interest on the part of the State, Civil Defense Commission and the local Office of Civil Defense deserves the consideration of the public.

School grounds and athletic fields in New York State cover about 16,000 acres. Another 50,000 acres are given over to State, County, and Municipal Parks.

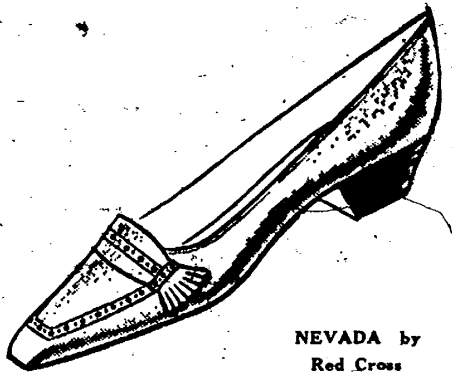
