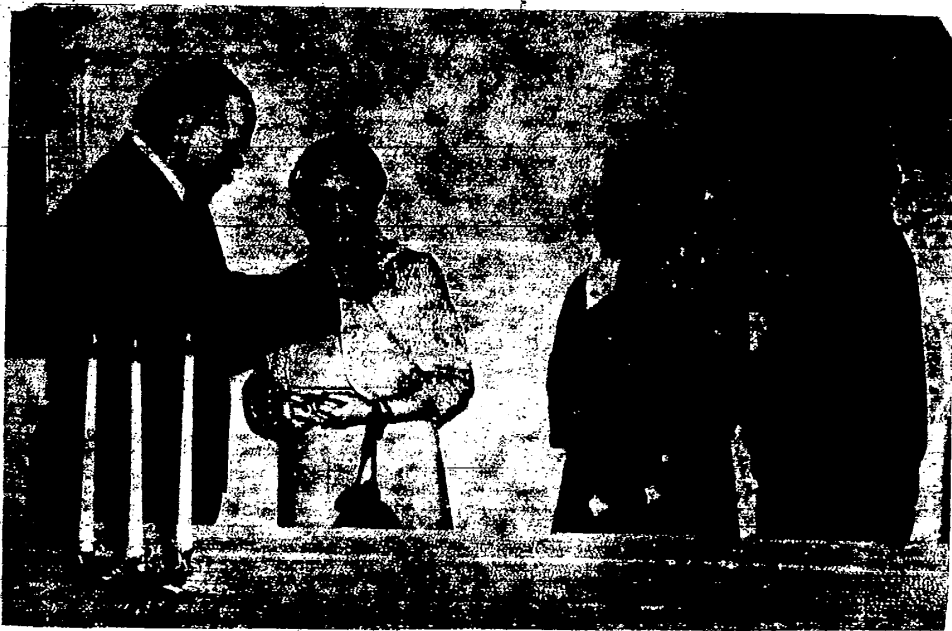


## Two Eastern Star Ladies Presented 50 Year Pins
