Fox Trapping Contest

The Allegany County Board of Supervisors, the Allegany County Sportsmen's Federation and the Allegany County 4-H Department are jointly promoting a fox trapping contest for school age boys and girls this spring.

The contest which runs from April 15th through June 15th, will offer cash prizes for each person catching a fox. Each contestant setting a trap will be invited to the awards dinner following the contest.

Funds for this were appropriated by the Board of Supervisors in the hope that by keeping the fox population down, the rabies outbreak and resultant dangers and loss experienced a couple of years ago will not be repeated.

The Sportsmen's Federation are using the funds supplied by the Supervisors to offer prizes and the lure for use by the trappers. The local Sportsmen's Club members will distribute the lure to the competitors and are in charge of the awards dinner.

The 4-H Department, in cooperation with the Allegany County Agricultural Teachers, secured the services of state trappers, Harold McElheny and Linford Cooper of Rushford, to conduct ten training meetings throughout the county. Over 150 boys have indicated their intentions to participate in the contest.

It is hoped that the spring fox population may be controlled, thereby providing better hunting and lessen the danger of new rabies outbreaks.

Change in U. S. Coast Guard Academy Exam

A change in the date of the annual examination for admission to the U. S. Coast Guard Academy, New London, Connecticut, has been announced by the Coast Guard.

Beginning in 1963, the examination will consist of the December administration of the College Entrance Examination Board tests which will be given this year on 7 December 1963. Applicants living in the United States should apply before 8 November 1963 to take the test, while those living overseas should apply before 4 October 1963 to take the test.

Greenwood Central School News

Individual hearing tests for all students have been completed at Greenwood Central School by Mrs. Charity McCormick, School Nurse-Teacher. The tests administered once a year by Mrs. McCormick; uses a Belton Audiometer which is shared with Troupsburg.

Students are usually tested during the early part of the spring term thus enabling parents to take advantage of the summer vacation for treatment and correction of hearing problems. Results of the individual audiometer test are usually quite reliable.

Since colds and other temporary conditions may cause a decrease in auditory acuity, a second or re-check test is given to students who indicate hearing loss. A referral to the parents is then made by the school nurse. Students with questionable test results such as a 10 or more decibel loss in one or both ears, are among those referred for a complete otological examination.

Adequate follow-up and cooperation by parents to insure needed medical treatment is an important factor in the success of the conservation of hearing program at Greenwood. Many cases, prompt medical treatment helps to restore hearing or prevent further hearing loss.

Education can be provided for a child with a hearing loss. Procedures often include one or a combination of the following: hearing aids, correct seating in classes, voice and speech training, lip reading, vocational guidance, educational tutoring and special class education.

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
