Excerpts Of The Senior Trip

The most impressive place for me was Mount Vernon. We spent almost all of Easter afternoon there, and I would have loved to spend a couple more days there. Somehow, seeing the house and area in which George Washington lived made that era of history more alive.

The main house itself was not as large as I had expected it would be. The first floor consisted of halls, a dining room, and parlors, and upstairs there were several bedrooms. The kitchen, wine cellar, spinning room, storage rooms and butler's quarters were all separate from the main house. The kitchen fascinated me with its brick floor, wooden table and chairs, and huge roomy fireplace with brass kettles hanging in it. It seems impossible, though, that anyone could actually prepare a meal there.

There were many things that impressed me very much in Washington, D. C. First of all was the Washington Monument. Its size is really impressive, especially after having run up its stairs. It towers 555 feet into the air and has nearly 900 steps. It can be seen from nearly any part of Washington, and also from Virginia and Maryland.

Of all the things that I saw on my Senior Trip, the Lincoln Memorial was the one that impressed me the most. To me it showed the greatest appreciation that a nation could give to a man who led his country through some of its most dangerous and important years. His great speeches that are engraved on the walls of this great Memorial gives more tribute to his thinking and views for which the Civil War was fought to keep this great nation united.

The thing that impressed me the most was the cleanliness and quietness of Washington. There are no big factories or dirty buildings. All wiring is underground, therefore the whole city has a neat appearance.

In the Lincoln Memorial, I found that Lincoln, in consideration of his great size, was really quite true-to-life. I found it quite unbelievable that anyone could possibly make such a statue.

I was quite against going to Rock Creek Zoo for I thought it would just be like any other old zoo anywhere. To my surprise I even found fascination there with the most adorable bears you ever saw. I just would have liked to pet them. The only thing wrong with the zoo as with everything in Washington we didn't have enough time to see all we wanted.

There are so many things that I saw on my trip to Washington that it would be difficult to name any one thing which impressed me the most. However, one of the things I enjoyed seeing was the Air and Space Building at the Smithsonian Institute. In this building they had John Glen's Space Capsule, The Friendship of One wonders how he could keep track of all the instruments in his capsule.

Another thing that impressed me was Mount Vernon. This beautiful home where George Washington once lived has been restored and still has some original furniture. The view along the Potomac is a beautiful one and it is one which could never be forgotten.

To me the most impressive sight was the monument of Iwo Jima. This consisted of a statue of five soldiers all raising the American Flag during the Korean War. This monument, which was made out of stone, was so explicit in details that you could see the veins on the hands of the soldiers.

During a recent tour of Washington, D. C., the Senior Class of Andover Central School visited the United States Capitol. This building is very impressive, for many reasons. Upon entering the main room, one immediately observes the large paintings, which depict important events in our nation's history. A glance at the dome, overhead, reveals more artful displays of historical events.

Another artistic collection, in an adjacent vestibule, referred to as Statuary Hall, is that of statues, two from each state. Each statue is a memorial to an important figure in American history. This building also contains famous marble works, such as a marble staircase, made in Italy and assembled in the United States. The staircases are decorated by large paintings, often donated as well as commissioned. One such painting is executed on the largest canvas in the world. Moreover, these paintings are of various themes, such as pioneering.

I think the most impressive of all was the tour of the battlefield at Gettysburg. The surroundings seemed so real and exciting. The way the guide told of the battle itself almost seemed as though we could see it taking place right then. You could almost hear the roar of the cannons.

One of the things that impressed me the most while on our Senior Trip was the Bureau of Engraving and Printing. While touring through this building, we were able to see all the different processes of making money. We were told it takes about 15 days to complete a single dollar bill. The money is counted 12 times, eight times by hand and four times by machines.

The tour of Mount Vernon was very interesting. It had a great deal of scenic beauty as well as historic importance. It was interesting to see the genuine things which were used in the days of our first President, George Washington.

The Smithsonian Institute was another very interesting place to visit. The Hope Diamond was one thing that was on display. It is the largest cut diamond, and is insured for one million dollars. It is blue in color. The Wright Brothers first plane is also on display. I still don't see how it got off the ground.

The Capitol Building also had a great impression on me. Outside the room where Congress meets there are two lights. When a white one is on, it means there is an open session of Congress. When a red light is on, a closed session

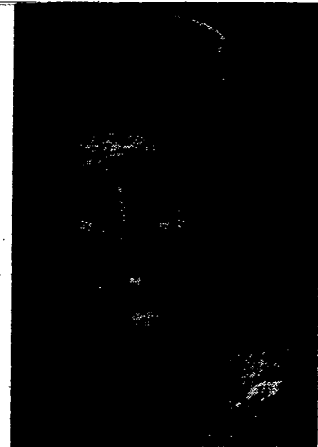
