Governor's Conference On Children And Youth Meet

Mrs. Charles G. Lynch, teacher of English and French in the Junior High School Department of Immaculate Conception School, Wellsville, was a delegate on Friday, May 3, at the Buffalo Area meeting of the Governor's Conference on Children and Youth.

This Youth Conference idea began in 1910 during the presidential term of Theodore Roosevelt and has been followed up and revived at various intervals since that date. The last White House Conference on Youth was in 1960 which organized and summarized recommendations that had been submitted from State Conference on Youth held during 1959.

The Buffalo Area Conference which included five counties was the sixth such meeting that has been held during the spring of 1963. Recommendations from these area conferences will be submitted at a N. Y. State Conference on Youth to be held in November of 1963.

The theme of this particular conference held at Buffalo was "Concern Yourselves With Rural Youth". There were "workshops" which concerned themselves with thinking on Family, Health, School Law and Group Work and Recreation. Mrs. Lynch was a member of the last group.
