## Theodore Smith Receives National Science Award

R. Theodore Smith, Instructor of Biology and Chemistry at Jamestown Community College, Jamestown, N. Y., has been awarded a National Science Foundation fellowship in chemistry at Tufts University, Medford, Mass.  
 This program is directed to instructors of general chemistry courses in Liberal Arts Colleges and junior colleges, such as Jamestown Community College. In making the announcement, Dr. Kent Wilson, Chairman of The Tufts Chemistry Department, indicated that Mr. Smith is one of twenty participants selected from the eastern part of the United States. The participants will study and discuss the chemistry courses presently being developed by both the Chemical Bond Approach Project (CBA) and the Chemical Education Materials Study (CHEMS) both of which approach the question of energetics and that of molecular structure on a level considerably more sophisticated than that of many traditional Freshman courses in college. It is anticipated that the presence of an increasing number of students exposed to these new high school courses will require revision in many college courses. In addition, the participants will consider topics in theoretical chemistry which are emphasized in modern introductory chemistry courses.

Mr. Smith received his undergraduate education at Syracuse University and his graduate education at Kansas State University, Syracuse University, and the University of Rochester Medical Center. He is active in civic and governmental affairs in Jamestown. He serves on the Board of Managers of the Municipal Laboratory at Jamestown General Hospital, and the Board of Directors of Chautauqua Lake Regions Inc. He is also President of the Faculty Student Association at Jamestown Community College and Editor of the Chautauqua County Democrat.  
 Mr. Smith's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert F. Smith reside at 37 Elm Street in Andover.

## Dairymen Favor Supply Management

Norbert Lynch, a delegate to the Metropolitan Cooperative Milk Producers Bargaining Agency from the And-Well Milk Producers Coop., Inc., reported today that the Agency has gone on record in favor of the basic principles of supply management and will work toward establishment of a program drawn up by Agency Manager Robert C. Forsythe.  
 Mr. Lynch was one of 73 delegates attending the semi-annual meeting of the House of Delegates of the Agency at the Randolph House, Syracuse, N. Y.

The issue was incorporated in two resolutions: The first, defining the basic policy said:  
 "The delegate body approves the principle of a program approach to supply management."  
 The second resolution, offered by Henry Hughes of Hornett, said:  
 "In carrying out the intent of the supply management resolution heretofore passed at this meeting, the directors and staff of this organization, insofar as possible, urge the adoption of the principles set forth in the National Dairy Voluntary Adjustment Program as formulated by Mr. Forsythe."  
 Forsythe's program, basically, is a voluntary milk-surplus reduction plan which is designed to reduce government costs, dairy surpluses and with the least disruption of the dairy industry.

Previous to passage of these two resolutions, delegates heard a summary of the dairy situation by Forsythe. He said, we as dairy farmers have to make a basic decision on the surplus problem. On the one hand we can support no program and allow declining prices to adjust supplies. Second is the regulated production approach.  
 Forsythe also indicated the outcome of the wheat referendum would have a bearing on dairy legislation this year. If it is defeated, he said, there probably will be little chance of any significant dairy legislation. If it is approved then we can probably expect Congress to pass on some form of dairy legislation.
