Andrew Carnegie Andover Library

May 20th, 1963, marks the 50th Anniversary of the formal offin-ing of the Carnegie Bunding of the Andover Free Library. Dack in 1911, Andrew Carnegie was asked to donate \$5,000 for the execution of a library uniform.

was assed to donate \$5,000 for the erection of a library building, which was obtained without much difficulty. One of the conditions of the grant was that 10% of the cost of the building be appropri-

ated annually by the people of Andover for its upkeep, with it receiving a vote of approval at the

hext town meeting.
The matter of site was promptly solved by Mrs. J. M. Brundage, who donated the land. Mr. Otis Dockstager of Elmira was engaged

as architect and submitted plans for a building to cost \$5,000. When Scott Prest saw these plans, instead of taking the job

pians, instead of taking the job as most contractors would have done, said that he could build a -much better building for the \$5,000 and twice rejected the plans until the Architect came up with plans for \$20,000 km.

with plans for a \$10,000 building. These plans called for cement floors and made otherwise fire-

These plans called for cement floors and made otherwise fire-proof.

These plans for a \$10,000 building were accepted and the building was erected by Scott Prest at his own figures of \$4,750, leaving as he said \$250 out of the grant with which to install a furnace. Besides doing all this, Scott Prest put into the bookcases and other parts of the trim, real oak instead of the cheaper lumber specified.

This is how Andover came to have a \$10,000 building for a library out of Andrew Carnegies original grant of \$5,000.

John E. Cannon was President of the Board at that time; Ben S. Brundage, Vice Pres.; Dr. John Common, Treasurer; Mrs. Arthur R. Burrows, Sec.; and Mrs. J. M. President of the parts of the pressurer.

Brundage was Librarian.
