## Downbeats

Last Friday, at the New York State School Music Association spring competition festival at Houghton College, the Andover Central School Concert Band received an "A" rating in Grade Six music, the most difficult music written for high school bands.

Two highly qualified adjudicators in band music, Dr. Maxwell Jarvis of Passaic, New Jersey, and Mr. Arthur Goranson, Jamestown, N. Y., judged the band on intonation, balance, rhythm technique, tone and interpretation.

A total of at least 105 points must be earned to receive the "A" rating. Dr. Jarvis gave the band 116 points, Mr. Goranson 106, for a combined score of 111 points. One hundred and twenty points is the highest possible score. This is the second consecutive year the Andover Band has received the "A" rating in Grade Six music.

The high school choir, in its first attempt at Grade Five music received a "B" rating. Music of this grade is very difficult and requires a great deal of control. The choirs were judged by Mrs. Lucille M. Baker from Ithaca College, and Mr. William Moonan from Rome High School, Rome, N. Y. Last year the Andover Choir received an "A" rating in Grade Four music.

Again this year, it was a "job well done." All the students participating in Senior Choir and Concert Band deserve sincere congratulations!

Friday evening the Andover Central School Music Department will present the annual Junior Concert. The event will take place at 8:00 p. m. in the school auditorium. No admission will be charged.

A variety of groups will perform including: Junior band, elementary band, elementary choir, Junior high girls choir.

The junior band is made up of students who have studied their respective instruments from two to three years. Selections they will play include: "Camptown Races", "Pegneno Mambo", "Crusaders Hymn" and "American Glory March."

The elementary band was formed just this year. This band is made up of instrumentalists who began their study only last October. Selections the elementary band will perform are: "Lightly Row", "Monkey Business", "Blow The Man Down", "Faith of Our Fathers" and "Jig Saw."
